CLUE: I saw a great parking spot.

ANSWER: Entrance sign to George Little Park (Park Avenue). Cited as the "Founder of Terrace," George Little arrived in this area in 1905.

CLUE: We were banking on a bear market.

ANSWER: You are looking at the shadow of the bear at the corner of Kalum Street and Lakelse Avenue. The bears were a 2006 project of the BC Lions Society. The bears were sold by auction to raise funds for programs for children with disabilities.

CLUE: Jim produced grand music.

ANSWER: Panel raised on the Grand Trunk Pathway in recognition of the late Jim Ryan, a central figure in music education and performance in the Terrace area. The panel displays a Jim Ryan composition entitled *The Spirit of Terrace*. The sign project was organized by the Dare to Dream Foundation.

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CLUE: **Stumped?** Get out the **chainsaw**.

ANSWER: The Logger chainsaw carving located at the west end of the 4600 Block Lakelse Avenue. A stump left from a tree removal was turned into an opportunity. On this site was a very mature maple tree planted by pioneer George Little. The carving was done by JJ's Woodart (Joerg Jung).



CLUE: If **beautification** is your goal, just for a lark, **add a "sea"**. (Look near an overpass.)

ANSWER: This is one of a series of large stones and plaques acknowledging supporters of beautification in Terrace, installed by the Terrace Beautification Society. The displays are located east of the Sande Overpass along the Millennium Pathway (near Staples). The one in the photograph is to thank organization founder George Clark-- hence add a "C" to "lark."



CLUE: Grasp the **fork** and dig the **potatoes?**

ANSWER: You have been looking at a pitchfork. Part of the sign for the very popular Skeena Valley Farmer's Market, staged Saturdays in spring and summer beside George Little Park.



CLUE: Too **stationary?** Do the **locomotion**.

ANSWER: At the foot of Kalum Street, near the George Little House, you will find this mural about the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway and the first train station in Terrace. It was painted in 2002 by a team led by Heather Webb.

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CLUE: No **training** required. You are on the right **path**.
ANSWER: Opposite Munroe Street along Highway 16 stands this small plaza celebrates the Grand Trunk Pathway. The plaque photographed recognizes governments, private sponsors and the Terrace Beautification Society in the creation of this public space. It is dated August, 2020.



CLUE: I'd call this good design which is **harmonious** and lifts the **spirits**.
ANSWER: The Bandshell at George Little Park was a BC Spirit Square project from 2010. The provincial government program was to celebrate BC's 150th anniversary.



CLUE: It is fitting that where one finds an overpass, the **engineering rocks**.
ANSWER: Just east of the Sande Street Overpass one finds this small sitting area with its concrete platform at the centre. The platform has directional arrows and information about local mountains. It was a gift to the City, conceived and presented by McElhanney Engineering, in the company's centennial year of 2010.
